

Key statistics - Main Settlements

Some details about the main towns and villages in the Annandale South Ward are given below:

The Royal Burgh of Annan is the principal town of Annandale and Eskdale and the third largest in Dumfries and Galloway. It has a population of 8389 with 4 primary schools and 1 secondary school. It is located on the B721 which is parallel with and linked to the nearby A74(M) and A75, and on the Carlisle to Glasgow train route. The town contains a number of facilities including a busy high street that is home to a variety of shops, museum, library, leisure facilities, 5 churches, hotels and B&B's.

Eastriggs, Dornock and Creca has a population of 1840 and is located on the B721 which is parallel with and linked to the nearby A74(M) and A75, and on the Carlisle to Glasgow train route, although no station currently exists. Eastriggs has a small number of shops, post office, library, public house and church along with a primary school that feeds into Annan Academy. Eastriggs was a planned village built during the 1st World War in 1915 to accommodate workers in munitions factories and is known as the Commonwealth Village with many of the streets being named after cities in the Commonwealth.

Cummertrees and **Cummertress West** have a population of 644 and include the settlements of Newbie and Powfoot. Cummertrees is a rural, primarily residential village and is bounded by Annan, the Solway Firth, Ruthwell and Dalton. Cummertrees Primary School is situated on the outskirts of the village and feeds into Annan Academy.

Ruthwell and **Clarencefield** is a typical estate village which was built to service the nearby Comlongon Castle and was the accommodation for its employees and their families. It is situated on the B724 7 miles from Annan and has a population of 400.

Dalton and **Carrutherstown** has a combined population of 357. Carrutherstown is a small village situated on the A75 eight miles south-east of Dumfries and seven miles from Annan. Within the village there is a primary school, Hetland Hall Hotel and Dino Land, which is a tourist attraction that brings many visitors into the area on an annual basis. Dalton is a small settlement 4 miles south of Lockerbie with an 18th-century church. Dalton has a Thai restaurant, a pub and a well-used village hall.

Public Health Improvement

The Public Health Improvement (PHI) workforce is part of the Community Health and Social Care Directorate. One PHI team works regionally, in partnership with Health and Social Care, Third Sector, Local Authority and communities to agree strategic direction and lead on action to deliver a regional plan to improve population health and wellbeing. With a focus on reducing health inequalities, the regional PHI plan includes poverty and inequalities; food insecurity; mental health and wellbeing; tobacco, alcohol and drug use prevention and harm reduction; physical activity/ re-ablement; diet and healthy weight; housing and homelessness; workplace health; children and young people's health and wellbeing; digital equality.

All other PHI practitioners are being located within 8 Home Teams developing across the region and will be focusing activity on early intervention and prevention with vulnerable communities and individuals; delivering and developing the Community Link Service; proactively engaging with colleagues, communities and partners to build and strengthen a 'community led' regional approach to PHI using community development methodology; and providing support for specific actions within the PHI Regional Plan and priority PHI issues.

NHS Home Teams

Home Teams will be fully integrated, multidisciplinary teams placed at the heart of the community who will work closely with people, their family, friends, carers and the wider local community and services to enable people to live healthy and active lives and live at home for longer.

They will support people within their community to live at home, close to their home or in a homely setting, preventing hospital admission where appropriate or safely bring them home from hospital earlier. A "Home First" approach is the default position for everyone. Home Teams will also ensure that people are at the heart of any decisions and will encourage people to improve and maintain their health and wellbeing through good conversations.
